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## Administrative News & Views

Dear Tigerton Families and Community,

I hope everyone had a safe and healthy break and that everyone had the opportunity to spend time with friends and family. We are grateful for a supportive community and look forward to a positive and successful spring semester in 2022!

### **End of Semester:**

The end of 2nd quarter/first semester is January 20. We encourage parents to monitor their student's grades via Skyward Gradebook and monitor their student's Google Classroom. Please reach out to teachers with any questions. As a reminder, Homework Help is available on Mondays and Thursdays from 3:30-4:30 p.m. in the commons for MS/HS students. Please encourage students to finish the semester strong as final projects and assessments take place in the next couple of weeks. There is no school on January 21 as it is a scheduled inservice day. Report cards will be sent out at the end of January.

### **School and District Accountability Report Cards:**

After a year off due to COVID, state accountability report cards returned this school year. School and district report cards annually report the performance of schools. Report cards include outcomes for four priority areas: Achievement, Growth, Target Group Outcomes, and On-Track to Graduation. The report cards can be found on the school district website. We use these report cards and other data including assessment information, parent survey results, teacher input, and student performance to develop a school improvement plan with annual goals and action steps.

### **School Improvement:**

There are two primary themes in our goals and action steps for our 21-22 school improvement plan: math curriculum review and more inclusionary practices. Our teachers have been participating in professional development on standards and best practices in math in addition to a review for new math materials throughout this school year. We are also working on more inclusionary practices which means that all students learn together in the regular classroom to the fullest extent possible while still meeting individual student needs.

### **Referendum:**

The Tigerton School Board is considering a resolution for a referendum in April 2022. I encourage you to read the enclosed information on the financial state of the district. This is an optimal time for the district to seek a referendum as we no longer need to levy tax dollars for debt.

I want to thank our parents and community for supporting Tigerton Schools and look forward to a safe and healthy 2022!

# Possible Referendum for School District of Tigerton

The School District of Tigerton's Board of Education is planning on moving in the direction of adopting a resolution for a five year non-recurring referendum. The board will make a final decision at the January 17, 2022, school board meeting. The election would take place on April 5, 2022.

The last referendum ceased in 2019-2020. We have utilized fund balance to continue to fund operational expenses and projects, such as: roof replacement and bus replacement. However, our fund balance is depleting:

The School District of Tigerton has compiled an anticipated five year budget with operational expenses, technology, transportation, and building and grounds needs in mind. This is an optimal time to go to referendum as we no longer need to levy for debt.

## Five Year Budget Assumptions:

- Average of \$61,000/years for building & grounds projects (above normal expenses)
- Replacement of school bus in 22-23, 24-25, & 26-27
- Maintain fund balance to avoid cash flow borrowing
- Last debt levy in 21-22
- Average of \$59,000 for technology upgrades/replacement
- Assumption of annual salary increases
- Maintain a stable mill rate
- Passing a non-recurring 5-year referendum

# Tigerton MS/HS Agriculture Department Happenings

It certainly has been a busy fall here in the Tigerton MS/HS Ag Department and FFA Chapter. Class sizes have increased in several classes, especially in Small Animal Care and Horticulture. Classes offered this year include: Forestry, Food Processing, Small Animal Care, Ag Productions, MS Rotation (9 week for grades 6-8), Horticulture, Food Science, Natural Resources, and Animal Science.

Here are some happenings of the school year so far:

- Since last January, the Agriculture Department has grown and harvested more than 150 pounds of fresh vegetables (salad greens in the Tower Gardens and garden produce in the school garden and community garden spaces) that were given to the school lunch program and the F.R.E.S.H. table in front of Anita Haircut. One tower garden is up and running with the other two to be operational after Christmas break.
- In September, the Food Science and Food Processing classes made tomato salsa for the school lunch program. We'll be making more tomato products with frozen tomatoes as we now have more freezer containers to store them in. In October, Food Science students made a batch of grape jelly, dried apples, and fruit leather during their Food Preservation unit.
- Ag, Leadership, and U students (8th grade) had fun learning about and testing their home water samples. After Christmas break, they will be learning about FFA opportunities and some basic Parliamentary Procedure motions as well as some food labs in fruit leather and ice cream.
- To raise money for their trip to the National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, the six members sold 95 fall mums in early October (two later were unable to attend). With the huge success of the mum sale, it looks like this may become an annual fundraiser! Four FFA members attended the 94th National FFA Convention and Expo during the last week of October with six other area schools on a charter bus and had a great time learning more about opportunities in agriculture (like horse rehabilitation and sanctuary, aquaponics in Chicago, the Indianapolis Zoo) and the National FFA Organization. We didn't get to see this in person, but Courtney Zimmerman of the Spencer FFA, WI, was elected as Central Region Vice President and will serve as a National FFA Officer for the coming year!
- Ag Productions students have learned about ag history, Wisconsin agriculture, soils, cells, and are currently learning about plants.
- In October, Horticulture students picked concord grapes for my sister-in-law after learning about Plant Classification terms and Plant Anatomy.
- Food Processing students finished a unit on hunger and food security and asked to do a baking contest. Their teams were randomly selected and they had to create and bake their own apple pies from scratch. The MS/HS staff served as judges and prizes were awarded based on their total team scores. They also just finished a food study of Christmas Around the World.
- Food Science students made a pumpkin pie and a banana cream pie from scratch (even the pudding) in class in honor of the Thanksgiving holiday season. The MS/HS staff also received and evaluated their pie samples. Current topics are Kitchen Math and Measurements and the rest of the Baking unit with holiday cookies, candy, and cakes.
- Small Animal Care just learned about dogs and are now learning about cats, rabbits, and their final Favorite Pet projects.
- Horticulture students have been busy recently learning about floral design and made holiday wreaths to take home. After Christmas they will be studying the various types of growing media, plant reproductions, and the process of plant cuttings in preparation of the spring plant sale.
- The FFA Chapter recently distributed about 325 Sweet Hunting Safety Reminders to five area businesses as part of their safety program and are planning more upcoming Community Outreach Projects like their entry in the Festival of Trees and Operation Christmas Cheer in December, as well as the Community Rabies Vaccination Clinic and Pet Supply Drive in January.

## PBIS Celebration at Tigerton Elementary School

Tigerton Elementary advocates a safe and positive school environment for every learner. PBIS stands for Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports. Together, parents, students, and staff share responsibility for teaching positive behavior and developing good citizens. The philosophy of PBIS is to help children develop self-discipline strategies to make good choices. Our focus is to acknowledge students for consistent positive behavior. We will stay on track and be expected to—Practice Respect, Accept Responsibility, Work Together, and Stay Safe.

The staff recognizes students' positive choices and behaviors during class and throughout the school day. When school expectations are followed, students are recognized for their efforts by receiving classroom tokens, such as: gems, stickers, marbles, or kittens. The class collects the tokens, and when students fill their jar or chart, the class earns a reward (extra recess, video, etc.), and classes also pull off a white stripe on "Roary" the Tiger. When "Roary" loses all his white stripes, the students earn a school-wide celebration.

Friday, November 19, was a PBIS Celebration Day at Tigerton Elementary! We recognized our students for being respectful, responsible, cooperative, and safe with a PBIS dance party. Students in grade Kindergarten through fifth attended. They got to dance to songs played by DJ Rewerts (our music teacher) and enjoyed his set up of lights. The students also were given a cookie and water for some nourishment. The students deserved to have fun after having such excellent behavior in school.

This fall, teachers and staff reinforced the following monthly themes: respect, responsibility, teamwork, and kindness. Students are now working towards a sledding celebration.

## 2020-2025 Dietary Guidelines for Americans—NEW from the USDA

On December 29, 2020, USDA and the Department of Health and Human Services jointly released the *2020-2025 Dietary Guidelines for Americans*. These are the cornerstone of the federal food assistance programs, and drive the delivery of nutrition education and nutrition policy.

USDA will be releasing infographics and other materials for your use in promoting these new guidelines; be on the lookout.

Dietary Guidelines for Americans is the nation's trusted resource for evidence-based nutrition guidance. The guidelines are designed for use by healthcare professionals and policy makers for outreach to the general public and provide the nutritional foundation for federal nutrition programs. The dietary guidelines should not be considered clinical guidelines for the treatment of disease.

As in previous editions, limited intake of these two food components is encouraged. In fact, this sentiment remains prominent throughout the policy document and complements the four overarching guidelines, which encourage Americans to “Make Every Bite Count” by:

- Following a healthy dietary pattern at every life stage.
- Customizing and enjoying nutrient-dense food and beverage choices to reflect personal preferences, cultural traditions, and budgetary considerations.
- Focusing on meeting food group needs with nutrient-dense foods and beverages from five food groups—vegetables, fruits, grains, dairy, and fortified soy alternatives, and proteins—and staying within calorie limits.
- Limiting foods and beverages higher in added sugars, saturated fat, and sodium, and limiting alcoholic beverages.
